Investigating Motion in Emotion in Autism Spectrum Conditions

Take part in our in-lab study (Harry Pitt Building) where we investigate how motion is perceived from people's facial expressions and how this relates to the ability to read faces.

Who are we looking for: Autistic adults 18-55 years old, normal or corrected-to normal-vision, native or equivalent English language proficiency.

What will the study involve: 1hr computer task where you indicate seeing movement in a face and judge facial expressions in videos, provide information on personal characteristics, complete a brief task on seeing patterns, and fill out questionnaires on autism traits, identifying emotions, and sensory judgements. Investigating Inclusive Practices and Mitigating Factors for Children Exhibiting Demand Avoidant Behaviours: A Mixed-Methods Study

This study explores demand avoidant behaviours in children and their relationship with anxiety, autistic traits, and educational experiences. It aims to identify effective strategies from the perspectives of children, parents, and teachers to improve support at home and school. It is the first study to include the child's voice directly.

Who are we looking for: Parents, teachers, and children aged 7–12

What will the study involve: A 20-minute online questionnaire for parents and teachers, with an optional 30–60-minute follow-up interview. Children aged 7+ are also invited to be interviewed with parental consent, this would be online. Participants have the option to be entered into a prize draw to win a £10 Amazon voucher.
