Step	Direction
1. At Reading Station	Look for the White Knight 20 (every ~10 min, ~10–15 min journey) or Claret 21 (every ~15 min, runs 24/7).
2. After alighting	Alight at University of Reading, Whiteknights House (5-minute walk) for the quickest access to Henley Business School.
3. Alternatives	A taxi costs around £10; walking directly takes approximately 40 minutes.
